Greetings fellow Knights, Dames, and Companions of Holy Isle! This past summer, I had the great pleasure of attending my first Grand Convent & Investiture which was held in Orlando, Florida. There was so much to take part in, to include a fantastic trip to NASA; something that I had always wanted to do. Conversely, during this very full and busy schedule, there were also breakaway sessions to help those in attendance better understand the different functions that take place, not only within SMOTJ, but within the local Priories. Some fantastic information was relayed to us, including visibility, recruiting efforts, and donation drives. However, the most pressing item I would like to address is concerning donations to the Jerusalem Mite. As it has come to my attention, there seems to be confusion on this particular topic I hope to clear up.

The donations to the Jerusalem Mite collected online when oblations are paid are part of our primary mission as members of SMOTJ. However, a low number of members contribute. In fact, it was reported that only 42% of members donated. This does not need to be a large or substantial donation, as every little bit helps. However, *no* donation makes a considerable impact. His Excellency Ralph Don Robinson, GCTJ, GMTJ, Grand Prior of GPUSA has issued a challenge and reward to all Priories regarding this.

For our Military families this will be a familiar concept. Grand Prior Robinson introduced streamers for Priory flags being distributed to those with notable achievements. Several were awarded at the Grand Banquet in Florida for various recognitions, with the promise that the Priory with the most improved donations to the Jerusalem Mite will receive a streamer to adorn their Priory flag. I encourage you to help Priory of the Holy Isle earn our first streamer. There is a secondary opportunity to make your Jerusalem Mite contribution at the annual donations drive. So, be on the lookout for a mailer from the Grand Aumonier.

Now, you may be asking yourself, "but I buy mites at my local events. Don't those count?" Well, not towards the national 501c3. To be sure, they still make an impact, so please continue to support your local events. The mites we purchase locally go towards our local impact. As our new Grand Aumonier, Chev. William D. Griffin taught us in his class; when the Knights Templar returned from the Holy Land, they took one day of rest before they were out in their community doing manual labor and other such tasks to physically support their local communities. This is what our locally purchased Mites do. Those funds are allocated for Priory needs and for the Aumonier to make donations to the local 501c3s the Priory supports. I certainly hope this clears up any confusion you may have had on the topic, or at least given a better understanding of how it works. Blessings!

Have you ever heard someone say, "Obstacles and opportunities are usually the opposite sides of the same coin?" Or, others might say, "Problems are really just opportunities that we haven't recognized yet." Interesting sayings, but what messages are they trying to convey to us?

As we go through life, things happen and we experience events with our families, or issues come up at work or with an organization to which we might belong. Sometimes those events might seem to throw a monkey wrench in the process, maybe creating a difficult situation for us, or disrupting our plans. What if we had planned a trip in a couple of weeks to see some National Parks for relaxation, but a big project just landed in our office, and we will not be able to get the time off for the trip. That would be an obstacle to our plans, but could there be an opportunity on the other side of that coin? Maybe if we do a good job on the project, we gain a new client for our business or get a nice bonus that can pay for a longer vacation to see more National Parks! It was stated earlier that "when the Knights Templar returned from the Holy Land, they took one day of rest before they were out in their

community doing manual labor and other such tasks to physically support their local communities." During one of Holy Isle's monthly ExCom meetings, earlier this year, we discussed different ways in which we could physically support our local



community. One such suggestion was to aid in roadside cleanup, through the Adopt-a-Highway program.

The program is nothing new. The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) established the Adopt-a-Highway program in 1988. And, since its creation more than 18,000 volunteers throughout the state have collected over 25,000 bags of trash and debris along roads and highways. It is estimated that with the efforts of its volunteers, Virginia has saved almost \$1.5 million it would have otherwise spent towards clean up.

A great perk that comes along with this effort is free advertising. Well...almost free. Through sweat-equity. After cleaning the designated roadside twice within the year, VDOT then provides signs with the organizations name on it; signaling drivers who takes responsibility for that area.

Holy Isle now has signs up in Fincastle, Virginia, located in Botetourt County. The members in the area meet about once a month to do a roadside cleanup. So now, not only are we as Templars "keeping the road to Jerusalem open", but we are also ensuring that the roads in our local community are open and safe from debris.

We can fill in all the information about our number of members, meetings, events, attendance, inventory, etc. The information that we need from you concerns the number of hours that you provide for community service activities during this calendar year.

What information do we need from you for the Priory Annual Report for community service activities? And, what constitutes a community service activity? Here are some examples of activities that might be included:

- Volunteering at the local voting precinct
- Volunteering with the local fire department or rescue squad
- Delivering meals for Meals on Wheels or helping at the local food pantry
- Volunteering as a docent at the local museum, church or other facility
- Highway trash pickups
- Serving as a mentor or volunteer at the local school

If you're not sure whether some activity should be included or not, send the information to us and the Executive Committee will review it to see if it meets the criteria from the Grand Priory to be included.

The information that we will need from you will be the name and address of the organization, the activity you participated in and the number of hours that you provided to the organization.
